Software

Night Sky 12 is designed for iOS/iPadOS 17 and watchOS 10.

It is compatible with: iOS 14.0 or later watchOS 7 or later tvOS 14 or later macOS 11 or above

Internet connection

After installation and setup are complete the core functions of Night Sky do not require a wi-fi or cellular data connection.

The Widgets, Stargazing Conditions, Night Sky Tonight and Night Sky News features all require an Internet connection to function. Satellite data is occasionally updated in the background and this also requires an internet connection. Night Sky can still be used without an internet connection but the app's functionality will be reduced.

Installing Night Sky

- 1. Tap the App Store app on your Home screen.
- 2. Browse or search for Night Sky then tap the icon for the app.
- 3. Tap Get. You may need to sign in with your Apple ID. You will be offered the option to select a free trial of the Plus version.

Night Sky is ready for use once it finishes downloading.



Tap on this icon on your device's home screen to start Night Sky. After the animated opening you can review a short tutorial, then hold your device towards the sky and watch as the stars and celestial bodies appear on your screen!

Permissions

Geolocation permissions are needed to create an accurate Sky View and provide local push notifications. Night Sky does not share your location data with iCandi Apps or anyone else.

Push notifications can update you about the stargazing conditions, rising times of astronomical objects, International Space Station (ISS) and Starlink satellite flyovers, breaking news stories and other events. Notifications can be customised in the app's Settings.

Access to the Calendar is required to allow the app to suggest Night Sky Tours for upcoming vacations and trips in your Calendar and to remind you about planetary events, meteor showers, space launches and other upcoming events.

Night Sky needs access to your device's camera for its Night Sky Blending, Augmented Reality and Astrophotography features (explained elsewhere in this guide). The app only accesses your camera when you are using these features. Images and videos you create with Night Sky are not shared with anyone else.

Sky View

Sky View is the heart of Night Sky.

Sky View presents you with a real-time simulation of the sky as currently seen from your current location or other location of your choice. Over 1.7 billion stars and selected deep sky objects are included. It is a 360° view and you can move it around with your finger or by moving your device (iPhone, iPad and Apple Watch only). On Apple Mac devices you can move around Sky View with your mouse or arrow keys.

You can zoom in on an object by "pulling apart" with two fingers on iPhones and iPads. To zoom in on Apple Mac devices, you can either double tap on the trackpad or double click the mouse.

As you zoom in more stars will become visible. An angular scale bar will appear at the top of the screen as you zoom in. This scale bar disappears when you stop zooming.


To zoom out "pinch in" with two fingers.

In Sky View, the Earth is "transparent" allowing you to look down to see the locations of objects under the horizon. If you zoom out when you are looking down, the view changes to a 3D model of the Earth (Night Sky+ feature only). You can turn this feature off in the Preferences section.

Sky Appearance

The sky appears a deep blue in Sky View at all times, but in the Preferences menu there is an option to give the daytime sky a lighter blue hue. At higher zoom levels the sky background colour will change to black.

In default view, the horizon is shown as a purple line. There are cardinal point indicators (N, E, S, W etc.) located on the horizon to show the direction you are facing. A compass rose is also placed high in the sky.



You can choose for the app to display an Environment Based Horizon. This is a decorative simulated environment on the horizon (above) in the Preferences menu. These include simulations of generic urban landscapes and simulations of the skylines visible from New York City, London, Paris and other major cities. The app selects an appropriate environment based on your location. The displayed environment is representational only and may not match the view from a precise location.

The stars are grouped into areas of the sky called constellations which are defined by some of the star patterns described by ancient civilisations or created by astronomers in historical times. Night Sky displays the 88 constellations accepted by the International Astronomical Union (IAU).




You can make these constellations more apparent in Sky View by selecting "Show constellation lines" in the Preferences section. This will highlight the constellation's shape by adding lines joining the brightest stars in the constellation.



For a historic perspective on the sky, you can add "Glass Mythology" figures to constellations in Sky View from the Preferences section. These appear as transparent artistic impressions of the people, creatures and objects which inspired the constellations.

Both the constellation lines and glass mythology figures can be made to fade away or entirely removed if you prefer. You can set this in the Preferences menu.



Double tapping on a constellation's name brings up a three dimensional view of the constellation which you can rotate with your finger to see the stars' relative distances. Tapping on the X in the corner will return to Sky View.

As well as the planets and stars, Sky View includes important and beautiful deep sky objects. These include nebulae, star clusters and galaxies. These are identified with their common names or their catalog designations. Night Sky includes every object in the Messier Catalogue and objects from the New General Catalogue (NGC) and Index Catalogue (IC).

Sky Tags

You can personalise Night Sky by labelling objects or features in Sky View with a coloured Sky Tag for future reference. Night Sky will remember your Tags and they will be displayed in Sky View and be included in Sky Tours. Night Sky's Search function can find your Sky Tags too. You can also share Sky Tags for other Night Sky users to find with iMessage and other services.

Creating Sky Tags

Hold your finger where you want the Tag to appear and a slider will appear to allow you to select your preferred colour. When a colour has been selected a tile will appear.

On this tile you can name the Tag and add notes (for example when you saw the star you are tagging or why you are tagging it). You can link a photo to the Tag and edit the colour of the Tag. There is a range of Icons you can select for your Tag. Tags can be added to a category (Favorite, Memorials, Sightings, Observational Planning, Family or your own custom category). Select Done when you have finished creating your Tag. You also be offered the option of adding the new Tag to your Notifications so that you will be alerted when the Tagged star is about to rise above the horizon.

There is an alternative method to create Sky Tags by inputting the celestial coordinates of the object you wish to tag in the Sky Tags section of the Menu.

Using Sky Tags



Tapping on an existing Sky Tag opens a tile giving you multiple options.

View Tag: Tapping on this opens a tile with the name of the Tag, its astronomical name (when available) and its coordinates. Tapping on the blue Directions button will bring the Tag to the centre of the Sky View.

All Tags: Tapping on this opens a tile with a list of all your Sky Tags.

Share Tag: This opens a tile with options to share the Tag with other Night Sky users by email, messaging or social media apps. Shared Sky Tags appear as links in emails, messages and social media posts. When the recipient taps on this link Night Sky opens and the Tag is added to the list of Sky Tags.

Remove Tag: This allows you to permanently remove a Sky Tag.

Night Sky users with Night Sky+ subscriptions can create an unlimited number of Sky Tags. Users of the free version of Night Sky are limited to two Sky tags.

Light Pollution Simulator (iPhone and iPad only)

Place two fingers anywhere in Sky View and move them up or down to increase or decrease star density. This will simulate different types of sky based on light pollution, from inner city skies to excellent dark sky sites.

You can select alternative views with the buttons in the upper right of Sky View.

Night Sky Blending (iPhone and iPad only)



Tap this button to access Night Sky Blending to merge the Sky View graphics with the real sky as seen by the camera on your device. The graphics and text help you to identify objects in the sky.

You are offered the option of adding the Sky View graphics to the scene from your device's camera. This is ideal if you are using Night Sky outdoors. Alternatively, if you are using Night Sky indoors and a LIDAR scanner is installed on your device, tapping on this button offers the option to scan the ceiling. If you tap on the ceiling on screen Night Sky will intelligently "remove" the ceiling and replace it with a virtual window onto the Night Sky.

Tapping this symbol again returns to the simulated view.

Alignment tool (iPhone and iPad only)



Tap on this button if Sky View is not correctly aligned with known compass directions or sky objects. You can then swipe left or right to fine align Sky View with the real sky. Tap on this button again when you are satisfied with the alignment.

Night Sky Compass (iPhone and iPad only)



Use this button to shift to Night Sky Compass mode. This is a quick guide to what you will see in the sky through the night. You can move the time back and forward with the slider control along the bottom. How many hours (plus or minus) you are offset from current time is displayed in a pink box at upper left. The stars and planets around the compass move as the time is adjusted, so that you can see which bright stars are visible at specified times and in specific directions.

Dark Adaptation View (iPhone and iPad only)



Use this button to shift to Dark Adaptation View. This makes Night Sky appear with a dim red backlight. Using this mode when you are observing the sky helps to maintain your eyes' dark adaptation. This button only appears on Sky View after sunset for your current location.

Quick Preferences



Use this button to open a menu listing display options to quickly customise Sky View to present the data that is most important to you. Tapping on these will select or unselect options. These options can also be selected through the Preferences menu. See the Preferences section for detailed descriptions.

Light Spectrum Array (iPhone and iPad only)



Sky View defaults to show you the sky as it appears to human eyes (optical view), but you can select a simulated sky background in other wavelengths by tapping on this button. You can cycle through the wavelengths by tapping repeatedly on this button.

Alternately, by holding a finger on this button for a couple of seconds until a menu appears. Select a wavelength band from the menu by tapping on it.

The regions of the spectrum available in Night Sky are

- Optical (visible light)
- $H\alpha$ (Hydrogen alpha: red light with a wavelength of 656.28nm)
- Infra red
- Microwaves
- Radio waves
- γ (gamma) rays
- X-rays
- Ultraviolet

The resolution of sky backgrounds in all regions of the spectrum have been improved in Night Sky 12.



This indicator will appear in the bottom right of Sky View when an interesting Live Sky Event such as a meteor shower or planetary conjunction is underway. Touching this icon will open the Live Event tile.



An estimated percentage of the current cloud cover at the Sky View location appears on this button. Touching this will take you to the Tonight In tile on the Menu Interface.



An estimated percentage of the light pollution at the Sky View location appears on this button. Touching this will take you to the Light Pollution tab on the Menu Interface (Night Sky+ feature).

Sky Objects

Touching many objects, such as planets and bright stars, in Sky View will display a link which will take you to a screen of additional information on the object (based on data from wikipedia.org). Buttons at the bottom allow you to access additional features. There are




This is the Planetary Landing button. Use it to switch Sky View location to a point on a celestial object's surface (Moon and Solar System planets and moons only)

3D Models



Many constellations, stars, planets and moons allow you to zoom into an Augmented Reality (AR) 3D model of the object.

This button allows you to view additional information on the modelled object.




This button allows you to share the model via iMessage with USDZ.




This button will add the rising time of the object over the horizon to your notifications.



This is the Planetary Landing button. Use it to switch your Sky View location to a point on the object's surface (Moon and planets only)


This button will open a tutorial on how to explore objects in AR.

With a double tap you can pull planets, stars, constellations and satellites out of the sky to examine in AR. Object exploration creates a 3D object centre for you to explore in more detail. You can add a Siri shortcut and share planets via iMessage with USDZ. When you finish you can throw the object back into the Night Sky.

Tapping on a planet, dwarf planet or moon will also switch your Sky View location to a point on its surface. You can return to your location on Earth by tapping on the purple band at the top of your screen.

Menu Interface


You can expand the Menu Interface to the height of your screen by pulling down on the tab at the bottom. This will reveal more tiles and buttons.



Editing the Main Menu

The Menu can be customised to suit your preferences. To do this either tap on the Edit button at the bottom of the Menu or touch and hold any Menu item until the items begin to jiggle. An item can be deleted by tapping on the Minus in its top left corner or dragged to another location in the Menu. Tapping on Reset Menu returns the Menu to its default layout.

When you have finished making changes, press the Done button.



Search bar

Type in the name of an object and Night Sky will display all the Night Sky features related to it. Night Sky can recognise some commonly used but unofficial names such as 'the Big Dipper' and 'the Plough'. When a user searches for these commonly used names, Night Sky will display the correct objects in the search results. Night Sky's database includes your Sky Tags, Solar System planets, dwarf planets plus the major Solar System moons, many comets, Earth satellites and rocket bodies. The database also includes constellations, stars, Messier Objects and selected deep sky objects including objects listed in the New General Catalogue (NGC) and Index Catalogue (IC). Each object has a concise description. Search results will suggest any available Night Sky options for the object. These options can include Show Directions, View in AR, Show 3D View and more.

You can narrow your search by tapping on categories to deselect them. The categories include Constellations, Stars, Planets and Dwarf Planets.


Objects that you will repeatedly wish to examine can be added to a Quick Find list by touching this button. To delete an object from your Quick Find list touch and hold it until a Minus symbol appears. Tapping on this will remove the object from Quick Find.

Spatial Audio Object Detection (iOS/iPadOS 15 or higher required)


AirPods Pro or AirPods Max users will receive audio cues to add an extra layer of immersion to the space navigation experience. These "chirps" can guide users through a 360° soundscape to the object.

To use Spatial Audio Object Detection, automatic sky tracking and the device's compass must be functional.

World Traveller Tile




Your current actual location is displayed here. You can see the sky from anywhere in the world by clicking on this tile to manually change the viewing location.




You can pick a viewing location from the map, find a viewing location with the search box or enter the latitude and longitude of the viewing location. Note that Night Sky will not use the viewing location you have selected as your actual location. You will continue to receive notifications and alerts for your actual location.

Space Travel Tile



Your current date and local time are displayed here. The app presents the time in the format (am/pm or 24 hour) you have selected in your device's settings.



Clicking on this tile opens an interface allowing you to change the viewing time and date. On an iPhone or iPad you can swipe across dates or times with a finger, on a Mac you do this by clicking on a date or time and dragging it across the screen. The Night Sky View will change to reflect the changes. You can move the view forward and back in time. This allows you, for example, to plan stargazing sessions for the evening ahead or look back to identify a planet you observed the week before.


Sky Timestamps

Use this button to easily save a time in the past or future as a Sky Timestamp. Saving dates and times as Timestamps allows the user to quickly and easily return to them. Users can save the sky as it appeared on significant birthdays or any other special dates.


Saved Sky Timestamps are listed in the Space Travel tile. Tapping on a timestamp will set Sky View to the saved time.

Tonight Tile



This displays the projected stargazing conditions for the forthcoming evening and an estimate of the best time for stargazing along with the current temperature and setting times of the Sun and Moon at your location.

Touching this tile shows you more details.



These include:

- Estimates of the current cloud coverage, visibility, wind speed, humidity and temperature at your location.
- All planets which can be observed (with the unaided eye or telescopes) from your location with their rising and setting times. The Sun and Moon are also included on this list.
- A table of useful current stargazing conditions for your location
- A graph displaying your location's predicted stargazing conditions rating across the hours of darkness for the night ahead. The predicted meteorological conditions are estimates based on local data.
- The time of the International Space Station's next flyover for your location along with its current crew roster.
- The time the next string of Starlink satellites will be visible from your location.
- A table of your location's predicted stargazing conditions for the next six days.
- A graph of your location's predicted stargazing conditions for the next six days.

Feature Discovery Tile



The intelligent Feature Discovery Tile previews one of the Night Sky's features. When a Night Sky appeals to you, tap on this tile to go straight to it.


Connected Stargazing - Night Sky+ For iPhone/iPad and Mac Only



This feature uses SharePlay to allow you to stargaze with friends and family when you are physically apart.

The session host sets up a Connected Stargazing session during a FaceTime call. Alternatively, the host can set up the session before the call starts and save it to run during the FaceTime call. Users with iPhones are recommended to use FaceTime Audio as the Picture in Picture obscures part of Sky View.

When the session starts other users in the call are automatically notified that the host has started a SharePlay experience in Night Sky. Users tap a prompt at the top of screen to join the session.



The host and the other participants can collaborate in adding stars, planets and other objects to find with the Add Objects button. Colored circles in Sky View appear to show where each participant's device is pointing. As objects are found other participants will see updates appearing as notifications on screen.

Once all the objects have been found there will be a summary of the objects found and the participants can choose to leave the session or more objects can be added to be found.

To use this feature, all users must have Night Sky 11 or above installed on devices running iOS 15.1 or above.



Earth Live Satellites- Night Sky+ Only

This brings up a 3D model of the Earth. The current positions of Earth satellites and rocket bodies are displayed around it (if Show Satellites has been selected in the Preferences). If Show Satellites has not been selected in the Preferences only the 3D Earth model will be shown.



My Tours- Night Sky+ Only

Selecting this tile allows you to design a Night Sky Tour in Sky View for a time and location of your choice. You can pick a location from a map or find a location by using the search bar. Once you have selected a location you will be invited to use either the current date or a custom date.

During a tour you will be prompted to move your device to follow an arrow to find a series of objects in Sky View or in the sky in AR mode.

The tour will show you notable objects visible in the sky at that location including the time they rise over the horizon. If you are going to be travelling, you can use this to plan what you will see there.

Completed tours are stored for you to replay. Stored tours can be deleted by holding their tiles until an X appears in the corner, pressing this will permanently delete the tour.

My Tours

You can create your own personal Tours to view yourself or share with others. To create a Tour, tap on Custom and then tap on the + button in the top right. You will be invited to add the content displayed at the start of your Tour. These are a cover image (you can take a photo or use an image from your Library) and a title for your tour. You can also add an optional description of what your Tour is about.

To add events to your Tour tap on



The two types of event are Locate Object and Show info.

Locate Object allows to you to add directions to any object included in Night Sky's database (including Sky Tags you have already created) to your Tour.

Show info is used to add a screen with a narration, an image and text to your Tour. Enter the text to be narrated into the Event Text box. Add the image you would like to be displayed from your camera or Library. Enter any text you would like to be displayed on the image in the Event image text box.

As you add events they will appear in a list which will be in the order of events in your Tour. You can

reorder an event in the list by touching and holding **event**, when you event to a new position in the list.

, when you do this you can drag the

To edit or delete an event, touch it and swipe it to the left. An Edit button and a Delete button will appear.

When you have added your events tap on Save. Your Tour will appear in a list under My Tours. To edit or delete a Tour, touch it and drag it to the left. An Edit button and a Delete button will appear.

All Tours can be shared with other Night Sky users with the Share button. Shared Tours appear as links in emails, messages and social media posts. When the recipient taps on this link Night Sky opens and the Tour is added to the list of Tours. When you share an object from Night Sky to a device with iOS16 installed they will appear on the Shared with You shelf on the Main Menu.



Live Sky Tour- Night Sky+ For iPhone/iPad and Apple Watch Only

Selecting this allows you to pick a Night Sky Tour in Sky View based on your current time and location. A short tour will show you the major constellations and planets, a medium tour will show more constellations plus the International Space Station and the long tour will point out bright stars in the constellations as well.



Night Sky Museum- Night Sky+ for iPhone/iPad Only

Tapping on this icon opens our augmented reality Museum of significant objects, artefacts and vehicles from the history of astronomy and space science. Tapping on each object brings up a short article explaining its significance and a blue button to tap to bring a 3D model of the subject into your environment for you to explore.



AR Grand Orrey- Night Sky+ for iPhone/iPad Only

An orrery is a scale model of the Solar System to illustrate the relative positions and motions of the planets.

This tile lets you access Night Sky's Grand Orrey. Night Sky includes an augmented reality orrey which you can bring into your home, classroom or office to simulate the positions of the Moon, planets and other Solar System features.

This feature is explained in its own section of the guide.




AR Planetary Portals- Night Sky+ for iPhone/iPad Only

This tile lets you step onto the surface of other planets by placing augmented reality (AR) portals around your room.

This feature is explained in its own section of the guide.



Aurora Forecast- Night Sky+ Only



An aurora is a natural light display in the sky caused by particles from the Sun interacting with the Earth's upper atmosphere. They are mostly visible in northerly and southerly regions around the Arctic and Antarctic.

Touching this tile will display a map showing your location with the closest area where an auroral display may be visible in the next 24 hours indicated in purple. The closest population centres in this area to your location are listed below the map with their distance and estimated percentage chance of an aurora being visible. Note that aurora are very unpredictable phenomena and their visibility can be limited by the local weather so aurorae may not become visible in the indicated area.



Moon Tours- Mac Only

Tapping this button takes you to a menu where you can select narrated tours of accurately simulated 3D locations on the Moon. There are three tours to choose from:

- Apollo 11: Tour the location where humans first landed on the Moon.
- Apollo 15: Tour a site where humans landed on the Moon in 1971.
- Copernicus Crater: This is a 3D simulation of a famous location on the Moon.




Night Sky Mindfulness- Night Sky+ for iPhone/iPad Only

Mindfulness is a relaxation technique where you concentrate on your mind, body and breathing.

This tile takes you to a menu where you can select a mindfulness breathing session of your preferred duration. The Mindfulness session takes you to Sky View (with interactivity disabled). You will be invited to follow a breathing cue with a gentle musical accompaniment. Your Mindfulness Minutes can be shared to Apple Health with quick access to the wind down shortcut in iOS 14 and above.


Light Pollution- Night Sky+ Only



Light pollution is the presence of human-made artificial light in the night environment. Excessive light pollution can limit your ability to see dimmer objects in the night-time sky.

Touching this tile will display a map showing your location with superimposed colour-coding indicating how severe the light pollution is estimated to be in your region. Your location is identified under the map.

If you are at a site with low light pollution you can share its location with the astronomical community by touching the white marker tag under the map.



The closest official Dark Sky site, along with its distance from your location and other details, is identified under your location. More of the closest dark sky locations are listed on tabs below this. Sliding a site's tab to the side allows you to access more information about the site and to get travel directions to the site. Note that this will exit Night Sky and take you to a mapping app on your device.

News



This tile takes you to our news section. Selecting a tile in the Night Sky News area takes to you a fascinating news story or feature from the exciting worlds of space and astronomy. You can find out more about what's in the sky tonight, discover stories from space history and even catch breaking news. Many stories have links to take you to celestial objects in Sky View or to add upcoming space events to your device's Calendar.


You can also email the story's author to ask your own Night Sky questions. There is a button to allow you to share the story by many ways including email, Messenger and social media too.

Events

Clicking on a tile in this selection takes you to a menu of upcoming Night Sky events, including links to take you to the events' celestial objects in Sky View or to add events to your device's Calendar.

Live Events

Live Events are current astronomical events visible in the sky. The Live Event will also be highlighted in Sky View while it is active. Tapping on this when there is an active Live Sky Event opens a new tile.

The Moon and Mars will share the same RA, with the Moon passing 0°39' to the north of Mars at 19:20 UTC on 16 September 2023.



This tile displays the event's details. There are also buttons you can use to Share the event by email or social media or to directly Show you the Event in Sky View. Use this feature to find the most exciting celestial wonders to view as soon as you launch Night Sky.

Tours from our Editors

Clicking on this tile presents a list of short narrated tours designed by our team of editors. These are categorised by subject. Swipe left or right to see more Tours in each category. Tapping on a Tour opens a tile with a description of the Tour and a play button. A Tour can be dismissed or ended by tapping on the X in the top right corner. New Tours are added every few days.



Sky Tags

Tapping on this opens the Sky Tags menu. Note that Show Sky Tags must be selected in Preferences to use this feature.

Create Sky Tag

Tapping on this allows to you to create a new Sky Tag anywhere in the sky. This feature is useful if, for example, you know the co-ordinates of a celestial object but cannot locate it. You can name the Tag with Tag Title, then tap on Tag Location to enter its celestial coordinates. Night Sky uses the standard equatorial coordinate system where an object's right ascension and declination define its position. Once you have selected the colour for your new Tag, tap on Create Sky Tag to complete the process. New Sky Tags appear at the bottom of the list of your Sky Tags.

Show Sky Tags control

Turning off this control will hide all Sky Tags in Sky View.


Sky Tags List

This list shows all the Sky Tags you have created or have had shared with you in order of creation (oldest first). The row of colour buttons allows you to select which colour (or colours of Tags) you wish to be selected. You can pick which categories you wish to see in the list with the row of category buttons.

Tapping on a Sky Tag brings up its details. These are the name of the Tag, its astronomical name (when available) and its coordinates. Tapping on the blue Directions button will bring the Tag to the centre of the Sky View.

You can remove a Sky Tag from the list by swiping left on the Tag. This permanently deletes the Tag.


Space Exploration Timeline



Tapping on this tile opens an illustrated tour of highlights in the history of space exploration from 1960 onwards. Swiping along the timeline (click on the edge of the timeline to do this on a Mac) will display the dates and brief details of key space launches and missions starting with Yuri Gagarin's historic flight. To find out more you can tap on the Read Article button (in some instances this

button will link to a third party site, iCandi Apps is not responsible for the content on any third party sites). As you advance the timeline, the number of satellites orbiting the Earth globe will increase.

Planetarium Visits



A planetarium is a science education facility where simulated night skies are projected on a domed ceiling.

Touching this tile displays the closest planetariums, public observatories and space science museums to your location with their distances from your location.


Touching the tile brings up a map showing the locations of the planetariums. Touching the information button on the location tag takes you to each planetarium's entry in the World Planetarium database (iCandi Apps is not responsible for the content on any third party sites). Return to the Menu by touching the Done button.

Astrophotography (iPhone and iPad only)

Making images of the sky and celestial objects with a camera is called Astrophotography.

Touching this tile lets you access Night Sky's powerful astrophotography tools to image the sky with the camera on your iPhone or iPad. These tools are explained in their own section of this guide.

Sky Quiz



This tile opens a menu where you can choose a fun multiple choice quiz to test your Night Sky knowledge. You can pick themed quizzes covering Satellites, Deep Space, Stars, Living in Space, Space History, Planets and Solar System. When the quiz finishes, you can see your score and share it with your friends by email or social media.

Night Sky Education Centre

This links to the Night Sky Education Resources webpage. This is an archive of free downloadable PDF's for teachers with activity sheets for students, providing engaging lesson ideas to use in the classroom or at home. Each lesson is categorised by suggested student age (with an additional category for Youth Groups) and divided into activities for students and astronomy background information for educators and leaders in youth groups (Scouts, Guides and similar organisations). Every lesson idea also contains accessible learning tips to help set up Night Sky for everyone.

This page also includes videos demonstrating how to use some of Night Sky's features.




This option is available when you have subscribed to Night Sky+ for over six months. When the gifted time period ends, the subscription is charged.

The settings for specific features are explained in the sections for those features. The following sections give some examples of common settings, including how to find them.

My Sky Notifications

Tap the + button in the top right to add your favourite sky objects to notifications

Preferences

The Preferences are described in their own section of this manual.

Change Language (iPhone/iPad only)

Touching this takes you to your device's Settings. Night Sky uses the language selected for your device. Night Sky 11 supports every language supported in the App Store.

Change App icon (Night Sky+ for iPhone/iPad only)

Tapping this opens a menu where you can select a new colour for the Night Sky icon.

Siri Shortcuts (iOS Devices only)

With iOS 12 or higher you can create a Siri short cut so that you can identify stars and other objects by holding your device to the sky and asking "Siri, what star is that?" This will work even if you haven't launched Night Sky. You can even quickly find Night Sky objects at any time by adding them to your Siri Shortcuts.

Import Night Sky Watch Face

If you have an iPhone paired with your Apple Watch you can use this function to add the Night Sky face to your Apple Watch.

Manage iOS Settings (iPhone/iPad only)

This option takes you to your device's Settings. Here you can allow Night Sky to access your Location, Calendar, Photos, Camera, Siri & Search, Notifications and Background App Refresh.

Clear Night Sky Cache

Use this to free up space on your device by removing unnecessary data.

Wallet

Manage My Night Sky +

Use this to open the screen where you can change or cancel your Night Sky+ subscription, upgrade to Night Sky Unlimited or restore past purchases. Note that cancelling subscriptions follows different procedures in Israel, South Africa and Turkey. Please contact the Apple Store if you have any queries about cancelling subscriptions.

Redeem Subscription Offer

If you have received a subscription discount code you can tap on this and you will be prompted to enter the code.

Stargazing Music

By setting this control to On Night Sky will play music to set the mood for stargazing.

Choose Music

Pick the musical background that suits you. There are five gentle and atmospheric pieces to choose from.

Sound Effects

Use this to change the sounds Night Sky plays when you get a notification, choose an option or other interaction.

Haptic Feedback

When this is activated you will feel a "tap" after you perform some actions (on supported devices only).

Turn System Haptics off or on.

Persistent Interface

Use this control to keep the interface menu on screen or permit it to fade out.

Use Miles

Kilometres are the default distance measurement unit in Night Sky. If you prefer you can switch to miles with this control.

Use Fahrenheit

Degrees Celsius are the default temperature measurement unit in Night Sky. If you prefer you can switch to degrees Fahrenheit with this control.

Celestial Compass

Use this to align your device with the compass in Sky View.

Turn off 3D Earth View (Night Sky+ only)

When this is set to off, zooming down on the Earth's surface will not bring up the 3D Earth model.

Touch Sensitivity

This slider controls how responsive the screen is to your finger movements.

Satellites

Show Satellites

Turning this on shows the location of bright Earth satellites in Sky View. When Show Satellites is selected you are given the option to turn on Rocket Bodies and Starlink satellites. If Rocket bodies is selected this will also display the brighter Rocket Bodies (discarded rocket stages and components) in Earth orbit. If Starlink satellites are selected this will also display the constellations of Starlink satellites in Earth orbit.

Turning Show Satellites off will also cancel any selected satellite notifications.

Effects

Night Mode (Red)

This makes Night Sky appear with a dim red backlight. Using this mode when you are observing the sky helps to maintain your eyes' dark adaptation.

Real Sky Representation

When this is selected, the sizes of planets, satellites and other objects are depicted with near realism in Sky View. When this control is turned off, the sizes of planets, satellites and other objects are further exaggerated to make them easier to recognise.

Show Sky Tags

Turning off this control will hide all Sky Tags in Sky View.

Environment Based Horizons

Selecting this removes the line representing the horizon and applies a simulated environment (including buildings) to the horizon in Sky View.

Daytime Effect

When this is selected, a lighter blue day sky effect is applied in Sky View.

Draw Trajectories and Orbits

When this option is selected, touching a planet, satellite or some other objects in Sky View will display a dotted line representing its orbital path. Each dot is a timestamp. Touching a dot in an orbit and holding it will display the exact time and date when the object was last at or will next reach that point in its orbit. The orbits of planets and recognised dwarf planets are shown in pink, Earth satellite orbits are in cyan and the Moon's orbit is displayed in blue.

Show Ecliptic

The Ecliptic is the mean plane of the planets in the Solar System. Turning this on shows it as a yellow dashed line in Sky View.

Show Meridian

Turning this on displays the meridian as a green dashed line. The meridian is the circle which passes through both the north and south celestial poles and the point in the sky directly above you (the zenith) and point directly beneath you (the nadir).

Show Equatorial Grid

Turning this on displays the grid used in the equatorial coordinate system used by astronomers. This grid appears in blue. The declination and hour angle values appear around the edge of the screen.

Show Azimuthal Grid

Selecting this option displays an altitude-azimuth (azimuthal) grid based on your position on the Earth's surface. This grid appears in cyan.

Show Glass Mythology

This superimposes a semi-transparent image over the constellations on screen in Sky View. These images are artist's renderings of the object, creature or legendary character each constellation represents. When you move away from the constellation, the Glass Constellation "melts" and fades away.

Stop Glass Mythology Melting

You can stop the Glass Constellations from fading away. They will remain continuously visible in Sky View.

Show Constellation Lines

When this is activated the brighter stars in a constellation are connected by narrow white lines. This makes it easier to pick out the constellation. When you move away from the constellation, the lines fade away.

Stop Text and Lines Disappearing

You can stop the Constellation Lines and associated text from fading away. They will remain continuously visible in Sky View.

Enable Messier Objects

Messier Objects are a set of 110 deep space objects in a catalogue originally created by astronomer Charles Messier. When this is activated labelled graphical depictions of each Messier object are displayed at the correct location in Sky View. These depictions are not to scale and may appear much brighter than the object appears in Earth's sky.

Meteor Showers

You can use this control to activate an animated graphic with an identifier of each of the annual meteor showers. The animated graphic appears in the correct location for the origin point in the sky (known as the "radiant") of the meteor shower and is displayed for a few days before and after the peak of the shower.

Hipparcos catalog

The Hipparcos catalogue is a list of over 118,200 stars. It was created by the European Space Agency.

When this is selected, every star in the Hipparcos catalogue is labelled with its identifier in Sky View. The identifier will be the letters "HIP" followed by a string of numbers. These appear as you zoom in on stars.

Accessibility

The slider bar can be used adjust the size of the text in Sky View.

Night Sky is compatible with Voiceover on iPhone/iPad and Mac. Voiceover can be turned on and off in your device's Settings.

Notifications

Do Not Disturb

The slider bar can be used to limit notification messages and sounds to a time range you have selected.

Astrophotography (iPhone and iPad only)

Night Sky comes with a powerful suite of astrophotography tools which you can access through the Astrophotography tile in the Menu Interface. These tools are described below.

The images made in Night Sky are stored in Photos on your device.

Astrophotography Tools



Photo/Video Mode

Use image mode to take still images and video mode to take videos



Exposure and ISO settings

You can control how much light your camera lets in with these controls.

Turn ISO Lock on to manually override the auto light settings

The ISO sensitivity to light can be adjusted with the slider from 24 to 768.

Turn the exposure lock on to manually override the duration your camera absorbs light for.

Use the slide to manually set the time the camera absorbs light for from 0.001 second to 0.5 second.

Shorter exposures are possible with higher ISO settings but this will increase the "noise" in the image, reducing its quality. You can experiment to optimise these settings for the image you are making.



Digital Focus

Turn the Focus Lock on to manually control the digital focus of the camera with a slider.



Digital Zoom

Use this to manually control the digital zoom of the camera (x1 to x10) with a slider.



Star and Satellite Trails

This allows you to capture the trails of stars and satellites. It leaves your camera's lens open for several minutes. For best results your device should be left stationary while you do this.



In this mode your camera becomes more sensitive but the images will be "noisier". "Noise" is the term used to describe dots which may appear in your image.



This function will help to remove these dots.



Object Optimisation

Select an option to use presets to automatically optimise your camera's zoom and light input settings for capturing particular objects. You can select Moon, Stars and Constellations or Planet.



Image Alignment Tools

Use this function to select one of five possible grids (2x2, 3x3, 5x5, 9x9). A grid is superimposed over your screen to help you to align the object(s) in your image. The grid will not appear in your image.



This presents a short guide to the most important features in the Astrophotography tools.



Use this to leave Astrophotography mode and return to the main Night Sky app.

Grand Orrey

Night Sky includes an augmented reality orrey which you can bring into your home, classroom or office. It accurately simulates the positions of the planets, Moon, Earth satellites and some NASA spacecraft exploring the Solar System.

Drag with two fingers to move the Solar System around the surrounding scene and pinch with two fingers change the scale of the orrey.

You can change the time and date represented by the orrey with the time and calendar bar at the bottom of the screen.



This control can turn the background stars and constellations on or off.



You can turn off the orbital paths of Solar System objects with this button.



This button turns the artificial satellites and interplanetary missions on and off.



Touch here to reorientate the Solar System to the direction you are facing.



This button adjusts your camera's light intensity. This allows you to change the brightness of the surroundings to make it easy to see the details of the orrey.



This button turns on and off the relative sizing of the planets. This allows you to see the planets at their correct relative sizes.



This button starts a short interactive tutorial demonstrating the features of the orrey.

Planetary Portals

This feature allows you to add augmented reality (AR) "portals" to other locations in the Solar System around your local environment. You can choose portals to the Sun, the planets, dwarf planets and their largest moons.

AR Portals supports People Occlusion with ARKIt 3.0 (iOS11 or above only). This means that a person can walk in front of a virtual object and it will appear behind them.



Touch this to add a new Planetary Portal to your surroundings. A yellow box will appear on your screen. Move your device until this box is placed over the location where you want the portal to appear.



Touching this button connects to other users' devices so your friends and family can share the Planetary Portals experience.




Touching this button refreshes the portals.



This button starts a short interactive tutorial showing the Planetary Portals controls.

Night Sky Widget

You can add the Night Sky Widget to your iPhone or iPad. On devices with iOS 16 or higher, you can add a Night Sky widget to your lock screen.



Night Sky supports Interactive Widgets in iOS 17. You can favorite an object from the Interactive Widget to get notifications about it rising in the future.

Night Sky supports Standby Mode in iOS 17 by displaying objects rising in the sky.



The Widget is available in five sizes:

- The small size Widget displays the name of the next object (ISS, Moon, Sun or planet) to rise or set at your location, the time this event will happen and an image of the object
- The medium size Widget adds the estimated cloud cover, current Moon phase, next sunset and sunrise times at your location.
- The large size Widget also shows a graph of the estimated stargazing conditions over the next 12 hours. A dot on the graph shows the time between sunset and sunrise when the weather conditions are projected to be best for star gazing.
- The small Night News headline Widget.
- The larger Night News headline Widget.

To add a Night Sky widget to your Home Screen

- 1. From the Home Screen, touch and hold a widget or an empty area until the apps jiggle.
- 2. Tap the Add button + in the upper-left corner.
- 3. Select the Night Sky widget, then swipe to select your preferred the size of widget and then tap Add Widget.
- 4. Tap Done.

You can also add the widget from Today View. From Today View, touch and hold the Night Sky widget until the quick actions menu opens, then tap Edit Home Screen. Drag the widget to the right edge of the screen until it appears on the Home Screen, then tap Done.

Night Sky on Apple TV

Night Sky is available on your Apple TV.

With your Apple TV remote you can select options from the Menu Bar at the top of the TV screen.

Live Sky Tours

Selecting Live Sky Tours displays further Options.

Live Sky View

This is similar to Sky View on iPhones or iPads. Use the Apple TV remote's tracking pad to move your field of view. To activate the Space Travel tab tap on the bottom edge of the touchpad on the Apple TV remote. Exit Space Travel by tapping on the bottom edge of the touchpad again. You can zoom in and out by tapping the right side edge of the touchpad on the remote and then swiping up and down to adjust the zoom level. Tap on the right edge again to exit. Click on objects with the tracking pad to select them and see more information about them. Navigate back to previous views using the remote's Menu button. You cannot create new Sky Tags in Apple TV but you can view Tags you have already created iPhone or iPad.

Tonight Tour

This is a sky tour from your current location.

Nearest Stargazing Site Tour

This is a sky tour from your nearest dark sky site for the current or the next day.

Apollo 11 – Night Sky+ only

This is a 3D simulation of the location where humans first landed on the Moon.

Apollo 15–Night Sky+ only

This is a 3D simulation of a site where humans landed on the Moon in 1971.

Copernicus Crater–Night Sky+ only

This is a 3D simulation of a famous location on the Moon.

American Solar Eclipse – Night Sky+ only

This is a 3D recreation of this 2017 event.

Lunar Eclipse – Night Sky+ only

This is a 3D recreation of this 2011 event.

All tours are narrated.

My Tours

This enables you to browse previous tours you have created.

Custom Tour

You can create tours of the sky from your choice of location. Click on this option then scroll around the map and click the location where you would like the custom tour to view the sky. You will then be offered options to choose the time and date you would like the tour to cover.

Object Search

This enables you search Night Sky's database to find out more information on celestial objects. You can search alphabetically or by scrolling down the list.

Mirroring Night Sky to your Apple TV

You can also access Night Sky on a TV by connecting your iPhone or iPad to the same Wi-Fi network as your Apple TV or AirPlay 2-compatible smart TV and activating Screen Mirroring.

Night Sky on Apple Watch


Use the Apple Watch App on a paired iPhone to install the Night Sky App on your Apple Watch. The Night Sky Apple Watch App puts Sky View on to the user's wrist.



You can launch Night Sky by tapping the Night Sky icon on your Apple Watch's home screen or a Watch Face complication.

Some Watch models (Series 5 and up) will calibrate Night Sky automatically but on earlier Watch versions when you launch Night Sky you are invited to manually calibrate the app. To do this find the Moon in the sky, turn to face it and tap the screen. If this is not possible tap "Can't see the Moon" and compass mode will appear, swipe the screen to align it in a known direction.

Once the Apple Watch has been aligned, Sky View is displayed. Sky view on an Apple Watch is very similar to Sky View on Macs and iOS devices. As you hold up your Apple Watch and move it, the Sky View will move in response.



As you move the Apple Watch a central green cursor will highlight and identify objects. Tap this cursor to select a highlighted object.



To see more information about it tap the object's name. You can scroll through this by rotating the Digital Crown.

You can start a narrated sky tour by tapping this icon in the upper left of the watch face.

Night Mode is selected by tapping this icon in the upper right. This makes Night Sky appear with a dim red backlight. Use this mode when you are observing the sky to help to maintain your eyes' dark adaptation.



Holding the Apple Watch horizontally will change Night Sky to compass mode.

The sky is displayed at the current time, turn the Digital Crown to advance or turn back the time (Space Travel mode).

You can import the Night Sky watch face from a paired iPhone using Import Night Sky Watch Face (in Settings).



The Night Sky watch face displays the current time and date and other data. These include:

- a graphic of the current Moon phase.
- a graph of the estimated stargazing conditions over the next 12 hours. A dot on the graph indicates the time between sunset and sunrise when the weather conditions are projected to be best for star gazing.
- an estimate of the light pollution (LP) at your location.

- a diagram showing the Sun and the orbits of Mercury, Venus and Earth. At a glance you can see the positions of these planets.
- The current temperature compared to today's minimum and maximum temperatures at your location.

You can also add the Night Sky complication to any watch face that supports complications. You can do this with the Apple Watch app on a paired iPhone.

Removing Night Sky from your iPad or iPhone

You can remove Night Sky from your device by following these steps.

- 1. Touch and hold the app.
- 2. Tap Delete App.
- 3. Tap Delete.

If you wish to delete Night Sky, you should also cancel your Night Sky+ subscription if you have one.

Troubleshooting

If Night Sky isn't working properly, you can quit the app and then try to restart it. Restarting Night Sky may resolve the problem.

If restarting Night Sky doesn't solve your problem, try restarting your device.

You should also ensure that you are using the current version of Night Sky.

If Night Sky is not showing your location or other local data correctly, ensure that you have given the app permission to access your location data and that your device is connected to a phone network or has a wifi connection. Please note that manually entering your location into the World Traveller Tile will not update your location data.

If Sky View is not aligned with the sky above you, please make sure you are not using a third party case on your device. These can sometimes interfere with your device's compass causing an inaccurate reading. You can also tap on the Sky Alignment button and swipe left or right to fine align Sky View with the real sky. Tap on this button again to complete this alignment process.
